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Regulatory Alert: FDA Proposes Rule Delaying New Nutrition Labeling Requirements

Compliance Deadline for New Nutrition Facts Panel, Serving Sizes
Delayed Approximately 1.5 Years

October 2, 2017

On October 2, 2017, the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) published a <u>proposed rule</u> which extends the compliance dates for the new requirements for nutrition and supplement facts labels, serving sizes, and dual column labeling by approximately 1.5 years. Under the proposed rule, the compliance date for manufacturers with \$10 million or more in annual food sales is extended from July 26, 2018, to January 1, 2020. The compliance date for manufacturers with less than \$10 million in annual food sales is extended to January 1, 2021.

The proposed rule <u>only</u> extends the compliance dates and does not change other aspects of the regulations.

Pending completion of the rulemaking delaying the compliance dates, FDA intends to exercise enforcement discretion with respect to the current July 26, 2018, and July 26, 2019, compliance dates. In other words FDA does not intend to enforce the current compliance dates even if the proposed rule delaying the compliance dates is not finalized before July 26, 2018 or July 26, 2019.
